Fund Objective

The primary objective of the portfolio will be to achieve capital growth with a reasonable level of income that is halaal (permissible) for investors through investment in predominantly the domestic equity market.

Fund Strategy

The portfolio will invest in equity securities in the JSE that comply with Shari'ah guidelines that govern Islamic Investment Funds and that prohibit investment in companies whose primary business is not consistent with Shari'ah principles. The Manager shall be permitted to invest on behalf of the portfolio in offshore investments as legislation permits.

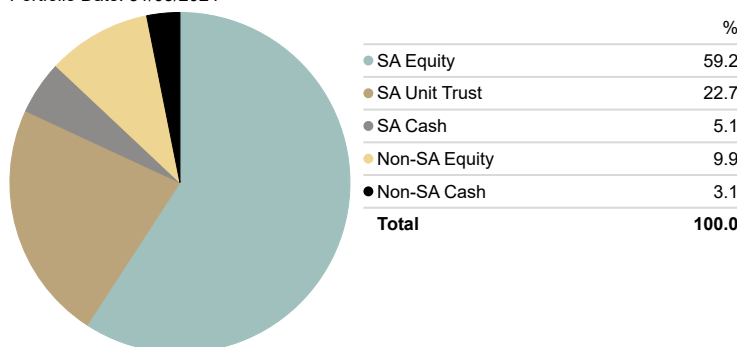

Risk Profile

You can afford to take on a higher level of risk (i.e., have a greater exposure to equities) because of your investment time horizon and/or your appetite for risk. You know that in taking the risk, you need to be patient if you want to achieve the results. So you are willing to invest for the long-term and are prepared to tolerate some volatility in the short term, in anticipation of the higher returns you expect to receive in five years or beyond.

Glossary Terms

Annualised Returns

Annualised return is the weighted average compound growth rate over the period measured.

Asset Allocation

Asset allocation is the percentage holding in different asset classes (i.e. equities, bonds, property, etc.). It is used to determine the level of diversification in a portfolio.

Cumulative Returns

Cumulative return is the total growth experienced over the period measured.

Distributions

The income that is generated from an investment and given to investors through monthly, quarterly, bi-annual or annual distribution pay-outs.

Diversification

This is a strategy designed to reduce risk within a portfolio by combining a variety of investments (or asset classes) such as equities, bonds, cash or property, which are unlikely to all move in the same direction at the same time. This is designed to reduce the risk (and protect against capital losses) within a portfolio. Diversification allows for more consistent performance under a wide range of economic conditions as it smoothes out the impact of negative market events. The positive performance of some investments or asset classes should neutralize the negative performance of others.

Financial Instruments

Derivatives also known as financial instruments (such as a future, option, or warrants) whose value derives from and is dependent on the change in value of an underlying asset (such as a commodity, currency, or security) to protect against risk (capital losses).

Fund Objective

The fund objective is the portfolio's core goal.

Fund Strategy

The fund strategy is the way that the fund is managed to achieve the fund objective.

Information Ratio

The Information Ratio measures the market risk-adjusted performance of an investment or portfolio. The greater a portfolio's Information Ratio, the better its risk-adjusted performance has been compared to the market in general.

Collective Investment Schemes

Collective Investment Schemes (CIS) (also called unit trusts) are portfolios of assets such as equities, bonds, cash and listed property, in which investors can buy units. They allow private investors to pool their money together into a single fund, thus spreading their risk across a range of investments, getting the benefit of professional fund management, and reducing their costs.

Market Capitalization

Market capitalization is the total value of the issued shares of a publicly traded company; it is calculated by multiplying the share price by the number of shares in issue.

Maximum Drawdown

The maximum drawdown measures the highest peak to trough loss experienced by the fund.

Participatory Interests

When you buy a unit trust, your money is pooled with that of many other investors. The total value of the pool of invested money in a unit trust fund is split into equal portions called participatory interests or units. When you invest your money in a unit trust, you buy a portion of the participatory interests in the total unit trust portfolio. Participatory interests are therefore the number of units that you have in a particular unit trust portfolio.

Sharpe Ratio

The Sharpe Ratio measures total risk-adjusted performance of an investment or portfolio. It measures the amount of risk associated with the returns generated by the portfolio and indicates whether a portfolio's returns are due to excessive risk or not. The greater a portfolio's Sharpe ratio, the better its risk-adjusted performance has been (i.e. a higher return with a contained risk profile, where the portfolio manager is not taking excessive risk to achieve those returns).

Standard Deviation

Standard deviation (also called monthly volatility) is a measure of how much returns on an investment change from month to month. It is typically used by investors to gauge the volatility expected of an investment.

Portfolio Manager Comment

As at 31 March 2024

Global Context

Five years ago many economies had historically low-interest rates, tame inflation, and even some pockets of deflation. The global pandemic, characterized by lockdowns and supply chain shocks, and its related stimulus packages reversed this. Subsequently, the world has experienced persistently high inflation which has resulted in the quickest interest rate hiking cycle in history. Over the same period, there has been a steady escalation in global geopolitical risk with two regional wars breaking out: Russia's invasion of Ukraine and, more recently, Israel's of Gaza.

While global supply chains are normalizing, they are also re-orientating themselves towards onshoring, near-shoring and friend-shoring initiatives. These changes have brought with them both higher costs and further disruptions.

Adding more complexity to the world is the politics around climate change which pushes against the economic realities of traditional (cheaper) energy markets. Europe especially has been forced to reconsider its energy mix due to geopolitical realities but no-one has been immune to revisiting many historical assumptions about fossil vs green energy. This is all occurring as China's retooled industrial capacity is reshaping automotives, renewables and battery storage markets.

Finally, the advent of social media and cryptocurrency and the rollout of Artificial Intelligence (AI) all have global ramifications that we are only just beginning to glimpse.

Local Market Pressures

Locally, long-term public sector malaise has seen key infrastructure—initially energy but now also transport and water—deteriorate. This has created economic headwinds against the local tax base, employment, consumers and economic growth. Our local financial market performance has suffered due to this and our exchange rate has remained volatile and vulnerable, despite a strong rebound in precious metals - led by gold.

Our Measured Approach

Amidst this complex mix of vectors and volatility, we have decided to rebalance our portfolios to manage risks and aid performance across our investments and mandates. We still prefer undervalued investments but give preference to those with resilient underlying characteristics. Furthermore, we have overlaid the macro nuances we see playing out both domestically and globally to try to avoid headwinds and maximise tailwinds, all the while balancing portfolio construction and optimal diversification to protect against any shocks.

Portfolio Changes

During the quarter, the Element Equity SCI Fund bucked local markets and rose +0.58% while the Shari'ah All Share Index fell -3.02%. Late rallies in gold and energy markets helped and, indeed, have continued into the next quarter. We have exited some lower-quality investments in favour of some better quality (and growing) companies (for example, switching PPC into Afrimat) while also tactically shifting some more defensive weightings in our portfolio upwards (for example, Aspen Pharmacare).

Summary & Conclusion

We do not see the world or South Africa getting markedly less risky or materially less complex any time soon. It makes sense, therefore, to adjust our portfolios for this reality. With respect to future returns, the *valuation* paid for an investment is critical to investor outcomes and—in increasingly uncertain times—the *quality* of the underlying also plays a significant influence. These attributes combined with a risk consciousness portfolio construction are the bedrock upon which we aim to grow your capital invested with us.
