



Investment Objective

The Fairtree Balanced Prescient Fund aims to generate long-term wealth for investors by producing inflation beating returns. The Fund is managed to outperform the South African - Multi Asset - High Equity peer group benchmark. The Fund's objective is to create medium to long-term capital growth, within the constraints governing retirement funds - Regulation 28. The Fund invests in a diversified and balanced range of asset classes and may invest in offshore securities when the benefit of higher returns and portfolio diversification are available.

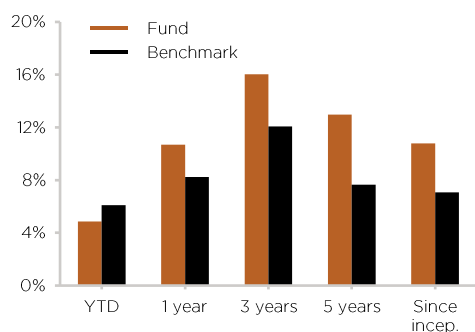
Investment Policy

The fund invests in a diverse combination of equities, property, bonds and money market instruments. The portfolio has a long-term focus and invests predominately in domestic securities. The fund may invest a maximum net foreign exposure of 45% (excl. South Africa). The fund is actively managed, both at security and asset class level to create capital growth while preserving capital on a real (above inflation) and absolute basis.

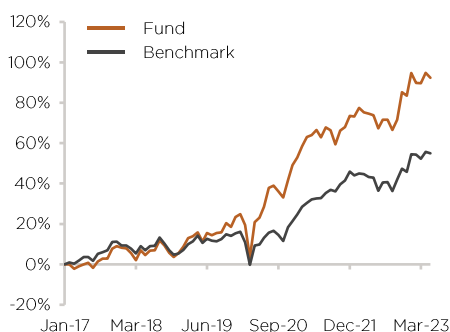
RISK INDICATOR

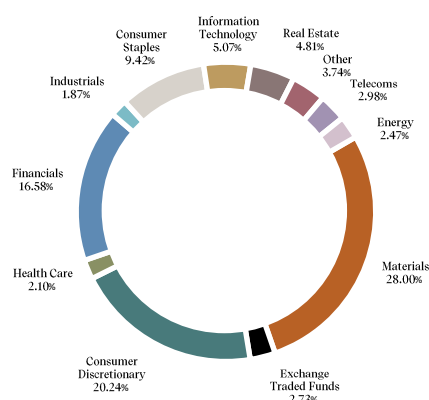

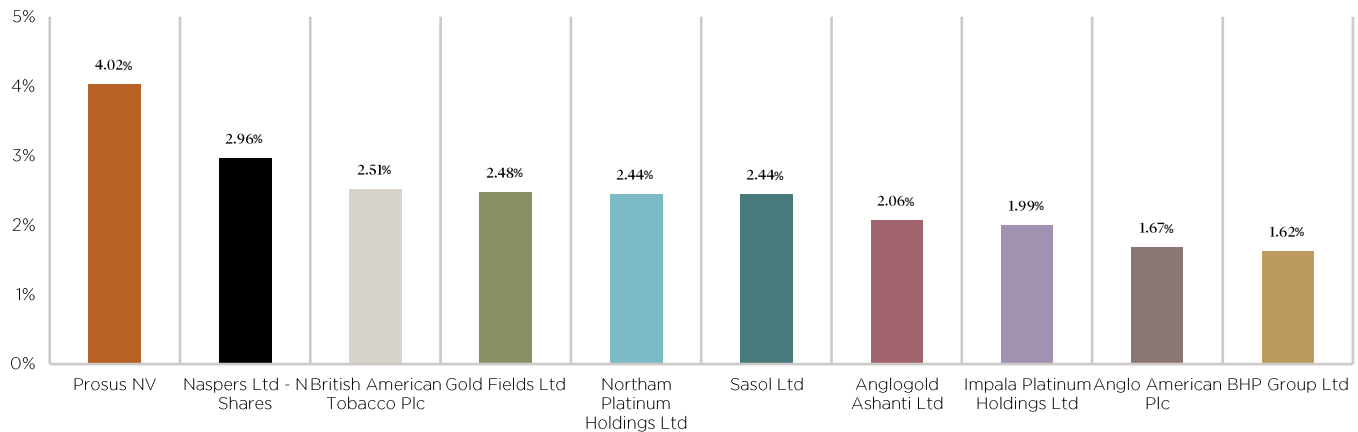

MARKET COMMENTARY

The second quarter of the year has been relatively peaceful compared to the turbulent first quarter. Despite concerns over the debt ceiling and indications from Federal Reserve officials about further interest rate increases, the US stock market continued to rise steadily over May. Worries regarding regional banks in the US have diminished, and overall economic data suggests that households are maintaining a reasonable spending pace. However, the manufacturing sector of the US economy is slowing down as consumers shift their spending from goods to services, while inventory levels remain high. This phenomenon is not limited to the US but also negatively impacting Europe and China. Although the services sector of the US economy is still expanding, the rate of expansion has slowed. We anticipate this deceleration to persist, pushing the economy into a mild recession. Inflation remains stubborn, and labour market data indicate a tight job market. We expect the Federal Reserve to pause soon and observe how the data develops in the coming months.

After initially benefiting from lower energy prices earlier this year, the European economy is now feeling the effects of higher interest rates. Inflation remains too high, and the European Central Bank (ECB) still has work to do in order to control it. Additionally, a lacklustre recovery in China is dragging down growth. The initial reopening impact did not meet expectations, particularly in the industrial, export, and property sectors, which lack positive momentum. Although the services sector is performing better, it is not the typical driver of growth. Consumer confidence is slowly recovering, suggesting a longer, gradual recovery process. We anticipate that Chinese officials will implement policy measures in the coming months to support the recovery.

South Africa recently faced one of its darkest months, both literally and figuratively, in its recent history. The economy is struggling due to energy shortages, and the government's plans to address the issue have been too slow. Furthermore, investor confidence was shaken by allegations that the country sold weapons to Russia, raising the possibility of economic sanctions if it does not maintain a neutral position in the Ukraine/Russia conflict. Consequently, the South African rand depreciated significantly, leading the South African Reserve Bank (SARB) to raise interest rates again, and foreign investors withdrew their funds from the country. We believe that some of these concerns are exaggerated. The US relies on South Africa as a partner, and as long as the country maintains its non-aligned stance, sanctions are unlikely to be imposed. The upcoming BRICS Summit will serve as a crucial test in this regard.

Global equities experienced a 1% loss, while the US market gained 0.6%, outperforming non-US markets. Emerging markets fell by 1.7%, primarily due to an 8.4% decline in China. South African equities also dropped by 6%, driven by declines in the banking and general retail sectors. South African government bonds experienced a 4.8% loss, and global bonds lost 2%. Commodity prices decreased as the US dollar strengthened. Iron ore and platinum both lost 7.6%, gold declined by 1.4%, and oil dropped by 8.7%.

Equities: Tighter financial conditions, slow growth and high policy uncertainty should weigh on valuations, profit margins and earnings. Valuations and earnings estimates remain somewhat elevated. We prefer South Africa and emerging market equities with better valuations, less exposure to inflation risks and more exposure to a China recovery. We increased exposure to defensive sectors and securities. We like resources and non-resource Rand hedge exposure like global consumer and industrial stocks.

Fixed Income: Local bond yields are attractive. Local core inflation remains contained but upside risks are high. Headline inflation has peaked, and we expect the SARB to be near the end of the hiking cycle soon. The sovereign credit premium remains elevated. Global developed market bonds remain attractive given the outlook for softer growth.

Currency: The US dollar will continue to soften this year on the back of improving China & divergent monetary policy within developed markets.



Glossary

Annualised Performance: Annualised performance shows longer term performance rescaled to a 1 year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

Highest & Lowest Performance: The highest and lowest performance for any 1 year over the period since inception have been shown.

NAV: The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

Current Yield: Annual income (interest or dividends) divided by the current price of the security.

Alpha: Denotes the outperformance of the fund over the benchmark.

Sharpe Ratio: The Sharpe ratio is used to indicate the excess return the portfolio delivers over the risk free rate per unit of risk adopted by the fund.

Standard Deviation: The deviation of the return stream relative to its own average.

Max Drawdown: The maximum peak to trough loss suffered by the Fund since inception.

Max Gain: Largest increase in any single month.

% Positive Month: The percentage of months since inception where the Fund has delivered positive return.

High Water Mark: The highest level of performance achieved over a specified period.

Performance Fee Cap: The maximum performance fee that can be charged over a specified period

Total Expense Ratio (TER%): The Total Expense Ratio (TER) is the percentage of the net asset value of the class of the Financial Product incurred as expenses relating to the administration of the Financial Product.

Performance fee incl. in TER (%) PF (%): The Performance Fee is a payment made to the Fund Manager for generating positive returns and is generally calculated as percentage of investment profits, often both realized and unrealized.

Transaction Costs (TIC%): The Transaction Costs (TC) is the percentage of the net asset value of the Financial Product incurred as costs relating to the buying and selling of the assets underlying the Financial Product.

Total Investment Charges TIC (%) = TER (%) + TC (%): The Total Investment Charges (TIC), the TER + the TC, is the percentage of the net asset value of the class of the Financial Product incurred as costs relating to the investment of the Financial Product. It should be noted that a TIC is the sum of two calculated ratios (TER+TC).

Specific Risk

Default Risk: The risk that the issuers of fixed income instruments may not be able to meet interest payments nor repay the money they have borrowed. The issuers credit quality is vital. The worse the credit quality, the greater the risk of default and therefore investment loss.

The portfolio has adhered to its object and there were no material changes to the composition of the Fund portfolio during the quarter.

Risk Indicator Definition

These portfolios generally hold more equity exposure than low risk portfolios but less than high risk portfolios. In turn the expected volatility is higher than the low risk portfolios but less than high risk portfolios. The probability of losses are higher than that of the low risk portfolios, but less than high risk portfolios. Expected potential long term investment returns could therefore be lower than high risk portfolios due to lower equity exposure, but higher than low risk portfolios.
